**TART HEART TO

With Tariff Bill Signed, Con-
gressmen and President Pre-
pare to Leave Capital.

SEVEN INSURGENTS

Republican Progressives Vote
Against Bill to the Last and
are Ignored.

Washington, Aug. 6.—The new
tariff bill went into effect at 9 a. m.
Friday in the 150 customs houses
throughout the country, and con-
gress is running away from the
place where it passed it just as fast
as it can.

Even President Taft is making
a quick getaway, after signing
the conference report with Sero-
no Payne's famous fountain pen
at 5:06 p. m. Thursday.

He lingered around the capitol
after making the bill a law long
enough to join the Republicans
who had helped it out, and to ig-
nore the ones who hadn't and to
tell how sorry he was that the
ones who had couldn't be with him
at that outdoor dinner celebration.
The thunderstorm that prevent-
ed the dinner, however, was the
smallest little storm of the many
that will go into history with the
bill, judging from newspaper crit-
icism the new tariff received Fri-
day.

There are seven Republican
storm centers. They voted against
the bill to the last—Cummins.

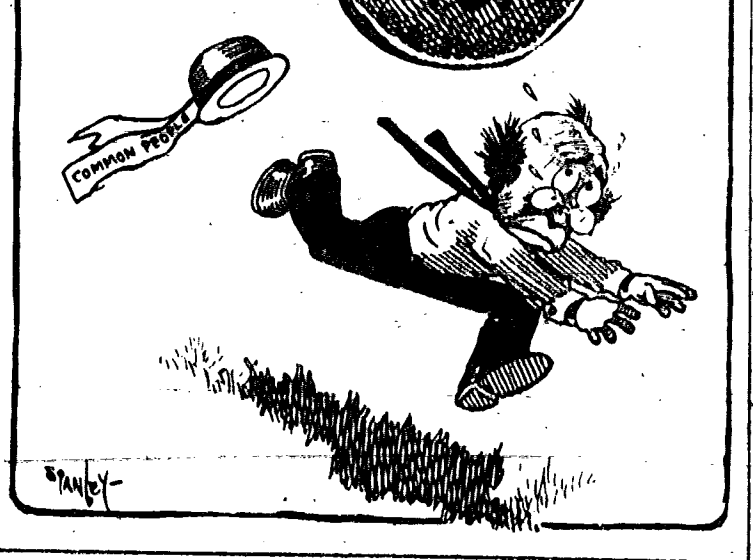

**YOUNG JOHN D.,

GIVES HIM MORE**

Young John D. Rockefeller again
showed his ability as a bargainer
Friday when he dickered with his
daddy and bought properties worth
\$1,000,000 for a dollar bill, the prop-
erties being, to wit:

The patriarchal homestead,
Euclid-av and E. 40th-st; a
clean half interest in the Gar-
field building, Euclid-av and E.
Sixth-st; a 52-foot frontage on
Euclid-av, near E. 18th-st; and
four parcels of land in East
Cleveland.

If young John D. does as well on
this dicker as he did with the Rocke-
feller building he will show that,
as a dickerer, he is indeed a chip
off the old block.

For, right after young John D.
bought the million-dollar Rocke-
feller building a few weeks ago,
he hustled around and found a
buyer willing to give him \$10 for
it, thereby making 999 per cent
on the dicker. The buyer was the
Abeytan Realty Co., whose sole
excuse for being, some folks say,
is to act as the real estate branch
of John D., Inc.

**PROMISES DOG'S
DEATH BECAUSE
HE TOLD POLICE**

A letter threatening the life of
Gaetano de Camilli, 3908 E. 80th-
st, because he had notified police
of demands made upon him by
the Ohio black hand, was made
public Friday by immigration au-
thorities at Washington. The let-
ter sent Camilli, after he informed
police of the extortion attempt,
said that he would "die like a
dog."

Two of the Italian black handers
now in jail in Ohio may have been
implicated in the assassination of
Jos. Petrosino, according to Post-
office Inspector Oldfield, in his re-
port made to the postoffice depart-
ment at Washington Friday.

Oldfield reports that Celogero
Vicario and Antonio Marfesi, two
of the suspects, are known to have
been in Italy at the time Petrosino
was shot. He says he holds evi-
dence that they have sent back
large sums of money for the pur-
pose, he believes, of aiding in the
defense of Italians arrested for
alleged complicity in that crime.
In all United reports, they have
forwarded \$3100.

According to one of the letters
which the postoffice authorities
hold, every member of the Ohio black
hand, known as the "Societa di
Banana," must have killed at least
10 men.

The cases of 18 members of the
Ohio band, under arrest on
charges of conspiracy, will go to
the grand jury in December.

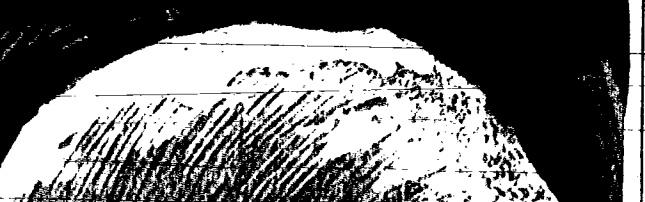
